I cannot believe we are already at the end of the first half term of this academic year. The time really has flown over.



#### **Read Write Inc Phonics**

We have carried out assessments in Read Write Inc this week and have been very impressed by the progress made through our consistent use of the reading scheme and also all of the support you have provided at home. Many children have made accelerated progress and therefore there will be changes to groupings and different books coming home after the holiday.

It has also been wonderful to hear from so many parents that they have seen real improvements in their children's reading and love of reading as a result of the work we are doing.


I realise that reading the same book 3 times at home can get repetitive but it really does impact positively on children's fluency and it is essential that children read the book which focuses upon the sound they are learning that week. Oxford Owl is a brilliant resource where we can share the books with you digitally to read at home. I am aware that some families do not have access to IT equipment at home so we will ensure that these families are provided with physical books. We will base this on the responses to the IT access questionnaire. We will try to provide opportunities for all children to access Oxford Owl at an appropriate time in school.

Unfortunately, I simply cannot afford to buy more books at the moment so that every child can bring home multiple physical books. My hope for the future is that we will have enough money to purchase more physical copies of the fiction books, non-fiction books and book bag books which will mean the children have a choice of 3 books to read. This, at the moment, is not possible due to the costs but it is in my future plans. We are grateful for all of your support with making the current system work so well.



## The Reading Shed

This week we have opened our very own reading shed in the yard. The school council last year were instrumental in this idea and it is so lovely to see it become a reality. The children were all very excited by it and were so keen to share stories (or Horrible History facts!) with each other. This will be a fantastic resource and will be maintained by our Reading Buddies to ensure it remains well organised and loved for everyone to enjoy.





Following discussion with some parents, I have decided to offer a coffee and cake afternoon where parents can stop by to enjoy an informal chat with some staff and governors. This will hopefully give you the opportunity to get to know new staff and governors a little more. You can also use the opportunity to have a look around the beautiful learning environments including our new library and outdoor continuous provision. Coffee, tea and cake will be available for a small donation.
