School starts at 8:45am. You can bring the children into the classroom and get them started on their Funky Finger activities!



During your child's time in Reception, they will..

- Be encouraged to become more independent as they move towards more formal working.
- Move towards End of Year Expectations which are known as Early Learning Goals.
- There won't be much homework, however I will always send home reading books.
- Complete baseline and end of year assessments.





Reading

At the beginning of the year, children will be sent home with books that have no words. These are for the children to gain a solid understanding of how a book works and improve their comprehension.

Eventually children will move onto banded reading books based on their phonics level.

In school, we will aim to read with every child once a week and change their books twice a week (Wednesday and Friday). These books will only be changed if the reading record entry is signed by an adult.

It is important that you read with your child as often as possible.

Reception end of year expectations.

Children read and understand simple sentences. They use phonic knowledge to decode regular words and read them aloud accurately. They read some common irregular words. (tricky words) They demonstrate understanding when talking with others about what they have read.



Writing

Reception End of Year Expectations

Children use their phonic knowledge to write words in ways which match their spoken sounds.

They also write some irregular common words.

They write simple sentences which can be read by themselves and others.

Some words are spelt correctly and others are phonetically plausible.






Reception are taught phonics every morning. We will start with set 1 sounds at the beginning of the year, doing one sound a day and reviewing on a Friday. After October half term, we will move onto set 2 if the children are ready to do so.







Maths

Maths is split into two main sections – Number and Shape, Space and Measure. In Reception children are taught these concepts very practically. In order to achieve greater depth of thinking, children are taught to solve problems in a range of ways. To begin with, they will do so with concrete objects (counting teddies, coins etc). When they are ready and secure, children will be moved on

to solving problems abstractly (mentally and without the aid of resources)

Reception End of Year Expectations

Children count reliably with numbers from one to 20.

Children can put numbers 1-20 in order.

Children can say which number is one more or less than a given number.

20.Using quantities and objects, they add and subtract two single-digit numbers and count on or back to find the answer.

They solve problems, including doubling, halving and sharing.

Children use everyday language to talk about size, weight, capacity, position, distance, time and money to compare quantities and objects and to solve problems.

They recognise, create and describe patterns.

They explore characteristics of everyday objects and shapes and use mathematical language to describe them.




PE- Thursday and Friday:

The children need named PE kit and trainers or sandshoes in school at all times. They need their blue shorts, white T shirts and any coloured joggers and sweatshirt or fleece top so they are prepared for indoor or outdoor PE all year. If your daughter wears tights please put some socks in the PE bag. Please put in a drawstring bag, which is available from school if you don't have one. These items are separate from the Wentworth kit. (See below)

The children need warm clothes to go underneath their waterproofs for forest school. This includes a long sleeve top and sweatshirt, warm socks, joggers or leggings, hat scarves and gloves etc. These will be kept separate from their PE kit
